Local Business Woman Pioneers New Women's Networking Group

Carla Walton, owner- knowledge, skills and of operator the 'upcycled' furniture store 'Carla's,' in the town centre has recently launched a new club aimed at supporting the town's local women in business.

When interviewed, Ms Walton said that many of Torley's economic benefits come from local businesses that are owned and operated by women, but too many in the area don't feel as well supported by the Lake District Chamber of Commerce as they want to feel.

'They are keen to grow and thrive within a dedicated group that can provide support and mentorship and enable them to share a collective wealth of

wisdom. They need a platform where their concerns about the slow pace of growth of the local economy, and the observance of good business practice and other important elements of running a business, can be taken more seriously.'

The group is called 'Torley Poppies,' with a logo of a simple tall red poppy. Ms Walton explained that the name was derived from Tall Poppies, a term that originated from New Zealand and Australia in reference to people who had achieved more success than others (i.e. they stood taller). 'Tall Poppy Syndrome' was a phrase coined by

those who felt condemned, judged, or resented for standing tall.

Mrs Walton believes that every woman should be encourage to stand tall, and Torley Poppies will give women in business a chance to shine. 'They deserve decent recognition for their valuable contributions to local business life,' she said. Torley Poppies is for women of any age or level of experience who run or exclusively manage a small local business. The group meets from 7-9pm, upstairs in the function room at The Feathers Inn, on the first Tuesday of each month. Enquiries and new members are welcome.

Farmers Threaten To Stage Protest at Rising Auction House Commission Charges

A group of Farmers met last week at the Torley community centre to discuss the proposed rise to commission charges for livestock sales by Auction Yards in Carlisle. A spokesperson for the group, Mr Robert (Bob) Shalloe, of Bracefields Farm said that many of the farmers in the area were angry that Auction Yards was seeking to raise its charges to almost double the current rates. 'This has an impact on both buyers and sellers, who will both be expected to pay commission at the new rates, and many are struggling to make a living as it is. We cannot allow this price hike to take place without at least offering a challenge.' Another well-known and respected farmer in the area, Mr Mark Raven, of Ravensdown Farm, said that if the only way to get Auction Yards to listen to reason was for every local farmer in the district to boycott the auctions altogether, that was what most were prepared to do. 'We'll go all the way to [----ing] Preston instead, if we have to,' he said.

Local vets Darren Davies and David Thornley from the Valley Veterinary Practice, who also attended the meeting, were in full support of the farmers, saying that the rare-breed livestock breeding programs that many were involved with would be put into jepoardy if the cost of buying and selling sheep, rams and cattle to sustain and expand the herds became cost-prohibitive because of unjustifiably inflated commission rates. The farmers have collectively appointed a solicitor to draft a letter to Auction Yards, requesting that the charges be kept at their current level or only marginally increased, and stating that there is likely to be a widespread protest if the increase does come into effect.

New Clubhouse for **Torley Tigers**

The old wood building currently being used, which dates back to the early 1960's, has suffered from vandalism in recent years, and was significantly damaged in the last storm. It has now been deemed officially s 'economically unviable' to repair.

The Tigers' principal coach, Barry Taylor, has confirmed that the demolition of the old clubhouse will start at the beginning of May, and construction of the new clubhouse will start around a week later.

'It's the ideal time to be doing it, with the lads being off now for the summer, By the time training starts again the clubhouse will be ready for action.'

This month's Aga recipe is from Mrs Debby Davies Apple & Cinnamon Flapjacks

Ingredients: 250g/9 oz. salted butter 175g/6oz. golden syrup 150g/5 oz. sugar 425g/15oz. rolled oats 1 tbsp. ground cinnamon 2 Bramley apples 75g/3 oz. sultanas

Line a traybake tin or small roasting tin with a silicone baking sheet or baking paper. Place the butter and syrup into a saucepan. Set aside 1 tbsp. of the sugar for sprinkling on the top of the flapjack. Add the remaining sugar to the pan and heat gently on the simmering plate, stirring occasionally until melted and smooth. 2. In a large bowl, mix the oats with the cinnamon. Peel, core and grate the apples. 3. Pour the melted contents of the pan over the oats, add the grated apple and sultanas. Mix thoroughly with a wooden spoon until fully combined.

4. Scrape the mixture into the prepared tin and spread/press into the corners of the tray. Gently press down to level the top. Sprinkle the flapjack mixture with the sugar that you set aside.
5. If you have a 3 or 4 oven AGA range cookerslide the tin onto the bottom runners of the baking oven and bake for approximately 20-25 minutes. The flapjack is ready when very slightly browned at the edges and slightly firm in the centre. It will continue to cook for a few minutes once out of the oven and will firm up as it cools.
'I'm a theatre nurse,' Mrs Davies said. 'I take a couple of these to work, and they give me a boost of energy when I'm too busy to take a real break.'

Pranksters Raise False Alarm For Torley Fire Service

The volunteer firefighters of Torley, most of whom work in and around the town, abandoned their jobs last Tuesday morning to respond to a 'fire' at the local primary school, which turned out to be a hoax. A smoke detector had gone off in the boys' toilets, and two 11-year-old boys were found to have been attempting to smoke. The boys were apparently aware of the fact that the smoke detectors, when activated by smoke, trigger an instant call to the fire service. Trying to learn to be 'cool' resulted in abject failure when they said they thought the fire engine turning up at the school would be funny. It is the third time so far this semester, that the school fire alarm has been set off by pranksters. 'I wish they'd stop doing this,' Volunteer Fire Chief Ray Burgess said, when contacted for comment. 'It makes us all really annoyed. If I said; 'bring back the birch,' a lot of people would be angry toward me, but let's just say that this is an issue of discipline and social responsibility. Children are being taught what their rights are but they know nothing about respect. The men in this service are busy people with paid jobs. They have more important things to do than chase their tails like this.' The boys' parents have been notified and detention notices have been issued.
